The Course

This course focuses on developing students' understanding of world history from approximately 12,000 B.C.E. to the present. Students investigate the content of world history for significant events, individuals, developments and processes in six historical periods, and develop historical thinking skills and methods.

This course is a college-level class, not college prep. As such, you will be exposed to the scope of material and level of academics one would expect in a world history survey course in college—if not more so.

To that end, this course is reading and writing intensive and emphasizes critical thinking through the use of primary and secondary source interpretation, open class discussion, debate, and research. You can expect to spend at minimum five hours a week of out-of-class time on this course.

- State building
- Economic systems
- Social structures
- Technology

THE TIME PERIODS:

- Foundations Era: 12,000 BCE ... to 600 BCE
- Classical Era: 600 BCE to 1200 CE
- Post Classical Era: 600 CE to 1450 CE
- Early Modern Era: 1450 CE to 1750 CE
- Modern Era: 1750 CE to 1900
- Contemporary Era: 1900 to present

Requirements, Grades and Homework

Materials & Organization:
